On October 6, 2020, CARB held a workshop regarding their <u>proposal</u> to eliminate non-electric forklifts. CARB's proposal presented at the workshop would require retirement of any 2017 or older gasoline, propane, natural gas and/or diesel forklifts 8,000 pounds or less lift capacity by 2025. This proposed regulation would no longer exempt forklifts fleets of 3 or less. CARB's proposal is intended to ultimately require any Class 4 – 7 forklift to be replaced with an electric forklift (Class 1 and 2). <u>Telehandlers and reachlifts are excluded</u>.

To identify the impact on the construction industry, the Construction Industry Air Quality Coalition (CIAQC) would like your input about where forklifts are used for your operations, and other input about annual use, fleet size, etc.

Survey responses will be submitted directly to CIAQC.

Reminder! Post Your Cal/OSHA 300A Log February 1 to April 30



California law requires employers to post the Cal/OSHA Form 300A from February 1 to April 30 of the year following the year covered by the form. That means your 2020 Form 300A should be posted February 1 through April 30.

- Display it in a conspicuous area where notices to employees are customarily located.
- Make a copy of the form available to employees that move from worksite to worksite and to employees that do not have a fixed establishment to which they report.
- Take it down upon conclusion of the required posting time.
- Keep it on file for five years following the year to which it applies.
- Provide a copy of the summary (Form 300A) or the log (Form 300) to current and former employees and their representatives upon request.

Note: Even if there were no injuries during the covered year, the summary log must still be displayed.

Many employers in California must *also* comply with <u>electronic submission of workplace injury and illness records</u> requirements by March 2nd each year. Cal/OSHA has posted details on which employers are required to submit the electronic reports as well as other information online. **Construction employers with more than 20 employees are subject to the online reporting requirements**.
